You will see from the above that most are very seldom used to contact police. I have highlighted those that would appear to be the exception. The one at main Street Frizington, in particular would appear to be a frequently used facility to contact police, often in an emergency. The same could be said of the one at Overend Road in Whitehaven, though to a somewhat lesser extent.

I would share your views that consideration needs to be given to the vulnerabilities of certain sections of the community, and would support that where this is the case, the maintenance of a public telephone facility is

important

I hope that some of the data provided above will assist, should the need to prioritise arise.

RE: Closure of BT Public Call Boxes in Copeland

I am writing on behalf of the North West Copeland Neighbourhood Forum, the last meeting of which was held on 16th July 2008. After hearing the information on the closures, from Alison Walton, Forum members were strongly opposed to closures in there area and asked that a letter be sent to Copeland Borough Council for inclusion in the formal response.

The Forums main concerns echoed that of other Forums in Copeland; call boxes are often a vital lifeline in rural areas with weak or sometimes non-existent mobile phone signal. Mobile phones cannot always be relied upon in this area; also not everyone can afford a mobile phone, especially low income families and elderly people.

Other concerns are as follows:

- BT hasn't included reverse charge calls and 999 calls in the annual call statistics.
 This raises the question of how often they are used in emergency situations, therefore proving their vital place in the community.
- The boxes earmarked for closure in the North West Copeland Forum Area include:

Screel View, Parton The Square, Parton Hinnings Road Distington

Parton residents were very concerned that two boxes in the village are earmarked for closure, especially the phone box in the Square. Parton has recently lost its Post Office and shop, with the removal of the phone box on the Square this will mean the only service left in the village will be the post box!

I hope you will find this information useful when compiling the Councils response.

Proposal to Remove BT Public Payphone - 01946 861294 - Ennerdale Bridge - CA23 3AR

I wish to object to BT's proposal to remove the above public telephone box.

With no mobile phone cover in the area, if this phone box is removed, there will be no local means to summon help or the emergency services, should a parishioner have a fault on their domestic service. This occurred 2 years ago when the whole village was disconnected for approximately 3 days. On that occasion a tragedy was narrowly averted by the early morning visit of a carer who discovered her elderly patient, collapsed on the floor, behind the door of her house, having tried to summon help during the previous night.

The emergency response fallback procedures for Ennerdale & Kinniside Primary School, against whose playground fence this phone box is located, I understand, also contemplate use of this public phone to summon help, in an emergency, should staff be unable to access their own telephone.

Due to the mountainous terrain and lack of mobile phone network cover, up to 9000 per year, Coast to Coast walkers, innumerable fell walkers, runners, ramblers, visitors etc., and members of the public, will be put at risk should this phone be removed. Only last year, a Coast to Coast walker collapsed and suffered a heart attack on reaching the village of Ennerdale Bridge. Fortunately, this occurred not far from this particular phone box and the local Mountain Rescue Service was able to be summoned and render aid promptly.

This payphone is one of only 2 BT public telephone boxes in the whole of Ennerdale. The other one is at Croasdale village. These phone boxes are the only means for members of the public to summon the Mountain Rescue Service should there be an accident on the surrounding fells.

Please do not permit BT to remove this community asset and safety lifeline.

On examining those boxes marked * it appears that these phone boxes are used to an acceptable level and should be retained due to this fact alone.

Screel View Whitehaven

Shows further that a proportion of people 234 have long term illness, 211 over the age of 65, and a 116 rented properties who may benefit from a public phone box plus the fact it is situated by the 595 and as stated may be a life line in case of an accident. (732)

Overend Road Whitehaven

Shows a high proportion of rented property nearly 40% an indication which may show a low proportion of home/mobile ownership. Plus the fact many people are on some from of welfare benefits and as stated may not have the financial resources to have a home/mobile phone to hand. (1,134)

Cliff Road Whitehaven

The proposed closure of BT Telephone Boxes, is to say the least, a marginal step backwards, especially in the year 2008.

In the wards that I represent which is Parton & Lowca the community at large are getting a very raw deal, as other rural areas are. Why for goodness sake are the rural communities being hit constantly when the elderly and young parents are at their most gullible.

Emergencies can happen anywhere in these villages just the same as in the Towns where the public telephone boxes are readily available for just that reason.

We have elderly people who do not own a private phone in their home or a mobile as they cannot use them apart from the fact all mobiles cannot receive a signal.

Public phone boxes have always been a way of life as far as I can remember wether they were used or not, but, it was always there for an emergency and life saver to the public.

The other area I represent is Distington and there is at this present time not one public phone box in the whole of Distington, which is a spread out village and there was two which were used on a regular basis, if one was out of order there was always another to use.

One of these phone boxes was near to the doctor's surgery and has been a life saver for that area of Distington. (WHAT HAPPENS NOW ?)

Really does it matter how many calls were made from these phone boxes, the fact of the matter is the phone box was part of the way of village life and in some places it still is.



Dear Sir.

I am writing, as the British Telecom notice invites, to object to the proposed closure of the telephone kiosk in Ennerdale Bridge.

The Village has lost its bus service and village store, and now has what can only be described as a vestige of a Post Office with future closure always on the cards. However it is strategically important for the increasingly popular Coast to Coast Walk from St Bees to the east coast. The next recognised stop into the remote Ennerdale valley is at Black Sail Youth Hostel approximately 8 miles further on.

It is impossible to obtain a signal for a mobile phone in the Village and beyond because of the mountainous terrain. This is particularly relevant should an emergency arise in the School when the telephones are out of order or in the case of a fire for example.

The notice says that "the kiosk is not being used sufficiently to continue the service" but the calls that are made are rarely trivial and frequently of extreme importance. It is a matter of quality rather than quantity. Indeed by the small size of the local population one would not expect a heavy use of the payphone.

I would have thought that British Telecom had at the very least a duty to the public to maintain a lifeline to the emergency services, and for walkers to be able to communicate with destinations along their journey. It would therefore be a disgrace for this public amenity to be removed.
