## Open Spaces – Public Health & Safety

### **Summary and Recommendation:**

This report advises Executive's of unexpected service demands placed upon the Open Spaces unit and its budgets to undertake the urgent health & safety works as identified in table 1.

#### Recommendation

That:

a) Executive note the report, and that

b) Option 3.3 is agreed and funding be made available from reserves to undertake the actions highlighted in table 1

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Members will be aware that the Council's Open Spaces unit deliver frontline environmental services to the public ranging from parks maintenance to enforcement action. These services are delivered within the agreed annual service plan and committed budgets.
- 1.2 In discharging its services, four service areas have been highlighted as requiring urgent attention due to public health and safety concerns:-

- 1.3 Temporary short-term measures have been put in place to protect the public through the use of protective barriers to cordons.
- 1.4 The funding to deliver the above works cannot be contained within the Open Spaces committed operational budgets for 2008/9 and therefore Executive is asked for agreement for funding to be made available from reserves.

#### 2. ARGUMENT

- 2.1 The council priorities for 2008/9 include providing high quality open spaces and making Copeland a safer place to be.
- 2.2 It is a statutory requirement for the council to take appropriate action to minimise risks to public safety.
- 2.3 The public health & safety issues raised in this report are outside the current Open Spaces resource provision and its budgets.
- 2.4 The health & safety concerns raised in the report are one-off costs.

#### 3. OPTIONS TO BE CONSIDERED

### 3.1 <u>To do nothing</u>

This would leave the council in a vulnerable position and open litigation

# 3.2 <u>To Support A and C and to remove play equipment from the Kells play area resulting from the damaged safety surfacing</u>

Costs for removal of play equipment will be contained within existing resources. This option will reduce overall costs to £16,500 though the Kells ward will be left with a significant reduction in its children play provision.

### 3.3 To support A,B & C

This option will resolve the health and safety concerns highlighted in the table 1.

#### 4. **CONCLUSIONS**

4.1 It is recommended that funding of £36,500 is made available from the Council's reserves to rectify the health and safety concerns described in this report.

# 5. FINANCIAL AND HUMAN RESOURCES IMPLICATIONS (INCLUDING SOURCES OF FINANCE)

5.1 Items (a) and (b), totalling £27,000, could be funded from the capital reserve. Item (c) £9,500 can be funded from unallocated revenue underspend in 2007/08.
