1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 The Local Government White Paper Strong and Prosperous Communities was published on 28 October. It contains a vision for change in English communities and many proposals to make that change happen. One aspect of change is the opportunity for local authorities to seek unitary status through a short deadline process.

- 1.2 The Council in common with other local authorities in two-tier areas has been invited to make a bid for unitary status on its own account or jointly with other authorities. An alternative opportunity arising from the White Paper is to work with other Cumbrian authorities to develop radically improved two tier working and to volunteer to be path-finders in this.
- 1.3 A presentation will be made to the Council at the meeting which summarises the main proposals in the White Paper.
- 1.4 Members are then invited to express their views in order to contribute to any response that the Council would wish to make to partners, other local authorities or the Secretary of State. It would then be for the Executive to finalise the response, having heard the views of as many Councillors as possible.
