	Mixed species	Prune various trees and shrubs to remove encroachment of footpaths and parking spaces on car park which is within a conservation area.			
REASON					

'Mixed species trees and shrubs bordering Catherine Street and the car park entrance road require pruning to remove encroachment onto footpaths and parking spaces. All shrubs within the area highlighted on attached map will be pruned back to curb line and reduced to approx. 1.8 metres in height. All trees within the area will be uplifted to 2.4 metres over footpaths and 4 metres over car park.'

DISCUSSION

The trees are Goat Willow and Pine species in the mature age category and show signs of normal vitality.

From the Cumberland Council website, the site falls within the Whitehaven Town Centre Conservation Area. A Tree Preservation Order (TPO) does not protect the trees.

We consider the work detailed in the application reasonable to prevent the trees becoming a nuisance.

Our TEMPO assessment (page 2) shows the trees definitely merit a TPO; however, given the proposed work specification we consider further legal protection is unwarranted at this time.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Inform the applicant they can carry out the work in the notification or wait for the sixweek determination period to lapse.
